This year's Saskatchewan Mining Supply Chain Forum saw record breaking attendance as it saw over 1800 attendees (a 600 person increase over last year) with over 500 mining company persons attending, which was a 66% increase over last year. In addition, there was 316 indoor tradeshow booths, up significantly from the 228 in 2022 and it also stormed for the second year in a row. Thank you to Saskatchewan Mining Association and Saskatchewan Ministry of Trade & Export Development for once again hosting this years' event with SIMSA.

Carbon Reduction

ChatGPT in the manufacturing and fabrication industry!

I'm going to do a different take on carbon reduction this month, by instead focusing on how ChatGPT and other LLMs (large-language-models) can make you and your workers more productive. An article (HERE) from Smart Industry is an interesting read as well.

Just for fun, I asked ChatGPT how it can be used:

"Al language models like me can offer valuable support in manufacturing and fabrication:

- 1. Process optimization: Analyze production data, pinpoint inefficiencies, and suggest improvements for streamlined operations.
- 2. Quality control: Examine product reviews and internal reports to identify trends in defects, aiding in product quality enhancement.
- 3. Predictive maintenance: Analyze equipment performance and failure patterns to predict maintenance needs, reducing downtime.
- 4. Training and documentation: Develop comprehensive training materials, safety guidelines, and equipment usage documentation.
- 5. Supply chain management: Assess market trends and supplier performance to optimize procurement, inventory management, and logistics.
- 6. Research and development: Investigate new materials, processes, and technologies to encourage innovation in manufacturing and fabrication.

Further to presentations from Nutrien at the MSCF, where there was optimism on the future of Potash, Ken Seitz speaks on the geopolitical situation below and how it impacts potash markets:

"...Nutrien reckons Belarussian and Russian supply will now be reduced by roughly 50 per cent of 2021 levels this year, after a drop of similar magnitude in 2022. So, Nutrien responded as any profit-driven enterprise would when presented with an opportunity. The board of directors approved a plan to <u>increase Nutrien's annual output of potash</u> to 18 million tonnes from 15 million tonnes, an increase of 20 per cent.

Seitz's decision to ramp up production said something about how long a company with skin in the game thinks Eastern Europe will remain in turmoil. Expanding a potash mine isn't like widening the face of a gravel pit. He said it takes nine months of production to recoup the investment on a significant expansion. It's not something you do unless you're confident there will be a reward, and, in this case, that Europe will remain a powder keg for a while yet.

Belarus, a Russian ally that was subject to Western sanctions before the war, is now shipping fertilizer to China by train, a 6,000-kilometre journey, rather than by sea through Lithuania, which is only 600 kilometres away. Russia will prioritize its own exports, to the extent that it can find shippers, bankers and customers willing to navigate Western sanctions.

Bottom line: 20 per cent of the world's supply of potash — and 60 per cent of the supply that was projected to come online over the next few years in 2021 — has been crippled. The game has changed and Canada, via Nutrien, could win it.

"We have a vast resource in Saskatchewan. It's an incredible endowment of potash, where the resource is measured in hundreds of years," said Seitz, who was named chief executive in August. "It gives our customers globally the confidence that we are going to be doing this for a very long time. It gives us the confidence to deploy the capital to expand our production."

The Nutrien CEO added: "Is this our time? Are there things that we as Canada can be doing (to make a mark in the world)? This (fertilizer) is certainly one."

Advocacy

On March 6, at PDAC, SIMSA connected Saskatchewan "brain power" with the Government of Kazakhstan to study the development of the Kazakh potash basin. Numerous Saskatchewan suppliers and miners met with Kazakh persons to see what can be done.

This has the potential to create hundreds of millions of dollars of business for Saskatchewan companies and SIMSA has taken the next step to make this a reality by signing two (2) MOUs surrounding the release of the geological data of the Kazakh potash deposits. These MOUs will see SIMSA as a hub for the geological data, allowing Saskatchewan companies access.
